1.Total credits for graduation: 135 (University Cores: 46 + College Cores: 4 + Department Cores: 60 + Interdisciplinary Program at least: 21 + General Electives: 4)
Upon graduation, you will be awarded a Bachelor degree certificate and a program certificate.

(1)There are three program interdisciplinary programs offered: European Business Affairs, European Culture and Language, European MICE and Translation.

(2)If students need to change the program, the newly replaced program course must still be at least 21 credits.

※Approaches to language teaching and learning 6 credits, or Computer assisted language instruction 3 credits + E-learning design and development 3 credits.

2.Students have to pass the Language Proficiency Test standards required.

3.Students are required to satisfied other graduation requirements of the school.

★The maximum credits earned from the Self-Learning project are 40.

1.The credits earned from the Self-Learning project can waive all the University Cores, except the English Courses and "HUMAN DEVELOPMENT".

The maximum credits open for waiver are 20.

2. The credits earned from the Self-Learning project can waive all the Department Cores, Department Electives and General Electives.

The maximum credits open for waiver are 20.

★For the required general education courses, must choose one course each from Society, law, and Politics group, Nature and Aesthetics group, Science and Popular Scientific Education group and Advance general education.

★The exact list of general education course to be offered is subject to the arrangement of the General Education Center's course catalog of the academic year. Prior to graduation, please check whether you have fulfilled the course requirement for each group.

★These elective courses listed are for reference only, please refer to the latest list on each department website every year to make sure the courses are available.

★The elective courses offered by each department are department electives for students in that department. While for students from different departments, those courses only count as general elective courses. (Different in credit)

★Should there be any changes in the course schedule of the department, please refer to the newest version.
